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Dear Friends of Chicago HOPES for Kids,

We are happy to share our 2023 annual report and impact story with you and all the members of our community. This was a Year of Expansion for Chicago HOPES. Expansion of our programs, capabilities and partnerships. Expansion that has helped move our organization forward in achieving our mission to provide comprehensive support to Chicago students and families experiencing homelessness. In 2023, HOPES served students through 14 after school programs impacting over 780 students and their families and delivering 4,425 hours of impactful learning and engagement.

Also during 2023, Chicago faced a major humanitarian crisis as thousands of migrants sought refuge here, placing enormous pressure on local services. A large number of students at two of our shelter partner sites were then spanish-Speaking only, and we moved quickly to develop bilingual programming at Cornerstone Community Outreach and Good News Partners. The establishment of these bilingual programs helped migrant children access resources, build connections, and feel safe in their new environments. Our team worked diligently to ensure that language barriers would not prevent anyone from participating in our educational programs.

Another important development was the strengthening of our partnership with Chicago Public Schools (CPS), specifically with the Students in Temporary Living Situations (STLS) department. HOPES staff worked with STLS to identify the neighborhoods and schools with the highest percentage of STLS enrolled students and in highest need of our services. In 2023, we developed a pilot program for a CPS school identified as having a critical need for our Literacy Leaders (middle school) program. This collaboration was a significant step forward in deepening our impact, and we look forward to building on this foundation.

Beyond our pilot program with CPS, HOPES after school program expanded to three additional sites in 2023 - Casa Esperanza, Rising Star Youth Center and A House in Austin. With these new partnerships, our staff has shown tremendous flexibility and ingenuity in adapting our program model to meet the specific needs of students facing the challenges of poverty and housing insecurity in different settings. The collaborative spirit of the HOPES team is truly inspiring.

We would like to extend our deepest gratitude to our donors. Your generous financial contributions have been instrumental in our ability to meet the evolving needs of our community. Your investment in our mission has enabled us to grow and make a tangible difference. Our success was possible through the loyal support of our funding partners including A Better Chicago, Reva & David Logan Foundation, The Donley Foundation, Joseph & Bessie Feinberg Foundation, Chicago Trading Company and Chicago Giving Circle.

2023 has been a pivotal year as we expanded efforts to build strong partnerships with colleges and universities, increasing volunteer engagement and support for our growing programs.

The Chicago HOPES team focused on building college relationships to attract more student volunteers. Our partnership with Loyola University, particularly through their community service program, Loyola 4 Chicago, has grown significantly. This program connects students with after school programs in Chicago and asks them to commit to weekly volunteerism. The results have been amazing with the number of Loyola University volunteers doubling from 2023 to 2024. HOPES Volunteer Manager, Jen Harden-Finn, attended Loyola's School of Social Work career fair, solidifying our official status as a partner and approved vendor for their program. We look forward to a growing collaboration with Loyola 4 Chicago.

We also built strong connections with The Chicago School, receiving our highest number of AmeriCorps State & National volunteers this past year from their program. The staff at The Chicago School place a high value on the experience that their students gain through volunteering. Our new relationship with the School of Social Work at Northeastern Illinois brought us AmeriCorps member Faith Benson, whose passion for social work was a great fit at HOPES. Finally, as we have continued to seek more volunteers on the South Side of the city, we are excited to report that we are now an approved vendor for Truman College's career fairs. This relationship opens new opportunities for engagement on the South Side wherethere is a great need for more quality after

school programming.

Beyond our college partnerships, we also expanded our team with new talent in 2023. We welcomed four new AmeriCorps VISTA members to the team. Mignely Nunez from Kentland, Indiana, joined as Development Coordinator, inspired by educators who impacted her life. Valentina Pulla-Corella, our Outreach and Social Media Coordinator from Quito, Ecuador, believes in the transformative power of education and saw her service as a chance to connect with Chicago. LaFlanicea Branch returned as Family Engagement Coordinator after serving with HOPES as an AmeriCorps State & National member, eager to support parents and plan family trips. Kelsey Fuller joined us from Southern California as Program Coordinator, driven by her passion for children and community. We are grateful for their commitment supporting Chicago students and families experiencing homelessness.

In the coming year, as we continue to grow these partnerships and welcome new members to our team, we are confident that our dedicated support will have an even greater impact on the lives of Chicago's youth and families experiencing homelessness. We plan to strengthen these partnerships even further, creating new volunteer opportunities that allow students to make meaningful contributions. By deepening our collaboration with these institutions, we aim to enhance our programs' reach and quality, bringing hope and academic support to more students and families in need across Chicago's communities.

2023 Memories from Program

From Budding Readers to Blooming Comprehension

At the start of the semester, Abby would ask me for help with her reading homework. The assignments consisted of a page long story followed by comprehension questions about the reading. Abby often answered the questions incorrectly. I suggested she reread the story to gain a better understanding, but she would complain that "it's too long." So, I would read the story aloud to her, and we would answer the questions together.

As time went on, Abby asked for help less and less. In fact, Abby began to read her homework aloud to me. One day she shared a comprehension question about the season of the year the story occurred. I assumed the story took place in the summer, which I suggested to Abby. She responded by pointing to a sentence that mentioned budding tulips. "Flowers start to bloom in spring, and it was wet so maybe it was April," she said. Abby had become so confident in her reading. I was so proud that she had gained enough confidence to correct her own teacher!

Under the Lens: Lucas' Inspiring Journey Through Science

Lucas was a first grader with dyslexia and ADHD, who struggled with read-alouds, homework, and often felt left out when seeing other kids read. He usually had a difficult time listening to instructions, despite being eager to engage.

One day, one of our enrichment partners, adorned with a white lab coat, came in to lead a microscope activity. The activity consisted of students sampling their own cheek cells and examining them. Lucas was enraptured. He listened quietly to the directions, and was amazed by how the liquid flowed and dyed the cheek cells. Lucas then meticulously prepared his cheek cell slide, asking insightful questions like, "How does the water travel up the paper towel?". When it was time to look at the slides under a microscope, Lucas could barely contain his excitement, saying "Look at this!" He pulled me over to the microscope. I was amazed! Lucas' cheek cell slide had turned out better than mine and better than the enrichment partners' slide!

I had never seen Lucas so engaged, and it was encouraging to see that there was an area of school that captured his attention!

The Bat Signal of Friendship: Bridging Language Barriers

At one of our bilingual programs, Levi, who only spoke English, struggled to connect with his Spanish-speaking peers and enjoy group activities, often leaving him frustrated. Eager to bridge the gap, Levi began asking to learn basic, conversational words in Spanish. But the real breakthrough came through a shared love of Batman.

One day, the students were given an art project to create their own set of wings. Diego, one of our Spanish-speaking students, wanted Batman wings. When Diego noticed that Levi was drawing the Batman symbol for his own wings, he got excited and, through gestures, asked Levi to help him. Levi, overjoyed by Diego's admiration, jumped in to help, drawing the Batman symbol on Diego's project. Then, he undid his own set of wings to visually teach Diego how to create the Batman wings of his dreams.

In that moment, language barriers faded, and their collaboration brought them closer, showing the power of friendship and connection that can form when we come together over shared interests.

Building Confidence, one Word at a Time: Samuel's Journey to Fluent Reading

Samuel was one of our ELL (English Language Learner) students who struggled to read on his own. Samuel would often refuse to read aloud due to his embarrassment over mispronouncing words. However, Samuel's confidence grew when he earned a new method of reading at HOPES After School Program.

Reading together, Samuel learned to successfully reread difficult words after pronouncing each letter phonetically. With more encouragement and celebration of pages read, Samuel began to reread words and sentences at a faster pace. After 10 minutes of using this strategy, Samuel was no longer whispering the words on the page. He was no longer slouched trying to hide his face, and instead was sitting up proudly with a smile on his face as he finished the book.

Later in the semester, Samuel began to take bigger steps and broadened his literacy to include books written in English. It's wonderful to see how encouraging and celebrating small goals can lead to taking on bigger challenges with no fear.
